Looking Ahead

We have a major service opportunity coming up May 6-9 at Camp Tanglewood in Augusta. This hands-on project will focus on repairs and improvements at the camp, and volunteers are encouraged to participate in what promises to be a meaningful and rewarding experience.

Our district continues to grow, with several new clubs being chartered or in development. These include the **Southern Crescent Rotaract Club, the Rotary Club of North Atlanta Professional Alliance**, and a new club forming that will meet at the Georgia Tech Hotel. This emerging club already has approximately 35 prospective members, thanks to the outstanding efforts of Audley Knight and the District Membership Committee. Additionally, Rotary International has introduced new leads software that we will begin implementing to help us better connect with prospective members and expand our reach. Companion clubs are also being explored as part of our growth strategy.

Education and leadership development remain a priority. The **District Learning Assembly will take place on April 11** in Columbus and is open for registration. This event is especially important for club officers and leaders as we prepare for the upcoming Rotary year.

Finally, **there is still time to register for the District Conference, which will be held April 16-19 at Lake Lanier Islands**. This year's conference promises to be an outstanding event filled with engaging speakers, fellowship, and fun activities for all. From golf, pickleball, boating, beach time, and the vibrant Margaritaville atmosphere, there will be something for everyone. Please remember that we are having a "Parade of Service Heroes" and costume contest on Friday at GameChangers. There will be awards for the Best club participation and the best individual service hero costumes.

Our Rotary Foundation

Up and Over!

How wonderful it is that month after month we have something to celebrate! This month it may seem oddly self-serving, but I certainly am pleased to do so for this. My home club, the **Rotary Club of Roswell**, has exceeded the \$2 million mark for total giving all time. Roswell is the second club in the district to attain that level. The first to do so, very appropriately, was the **Rotary Club of Atlanta**, as they are the oldest club in Georgia.

One of the areas I am most pleased with in that \$2 million dollar figure is how nicely it is split between dollars to the Annual Fund versus the dollars to Polio Plus. Of the \$2 million dollar figure just north of \$480,000 has landed in Polio Plus. As most of you know, the Polio Plus program in general, and Polio eradication specifically, is a true passion of mine. So, to have such a nice portion working in that arena is particularly comforting to me. As the District Foundation Chair, my role is to help raise and track the funding coming into the district. Both sides have such significant effects on the world. The Polio dollars receive a \$2 to every \$1 raised match by the Gates Foundation to continue the fight to eradicate Polio from the world, whereas half of every dollar that comes into the Annual Fund ends up coming back to the district three years later in the form of Global Grant dollars. Therefore, both sides of the equation are vital to the role Rotary plays, both worldwide and locally.

As our Rotary year winds down, it is good to keep in mind the wonderful ways our Foundation reaches different areas of the world and why it is so important to finish the year strong. Here are a few facts for you to keep at the forefront of your thoughts when considering a donation. Did you know that it only takes \$3 as an average cost to fully protect a child against polio? \$50 maintains water filters that help fight waterborne illnesses and \$200 to develop work opportunities by replacing livestock for people impacted by disasters.

Let's look at what the dollars were in 2024/25 to see where we should be headed in 2025/26 as this year ends off in a few months. In 2024/25 we had 468 district grants amounting to \$29 million dollars in program awards. There were 74 disaster recovery grants amounting to 1.9 million dollars and 1,423 global grants awarded amounting to \$88.2 million dollars. In addition, there was one program of scale grant for \$2 million dollars. All those figures come from our Rotary International website. The RI website is a place I encourage all Rotarians to look at from time to time to see the impact of your dollars.

There are always great articles to peruse that are not only uplifting but invigorating and should be pointed out to any potential prospect thinking of joining Rotary. It will give them a very good feeling about the organization they are thinking of joining. For instance, there is a wonderful article about the relief aid brought by Rotary after a devastating earthquake in Turkey. The article takes the reader through the continuing efforts made by Rotary that the people of Turkey see as the only path out of the devastation. You'll find another article on how Rotary is affecting the education system in Panama classrooms and how Rotarian efforts have raised the technology level of the classroom learning in the country. Examples go on and on.

In the end, it is hard not to carry a bit of pride in oneself, but more importantly in the organization we are all a part of - an organization called Rotary. All of you reading this article now are a part of that legacy. Keep pushing to close this year off strong, strong for all the people we serve in our local communities and around the world!

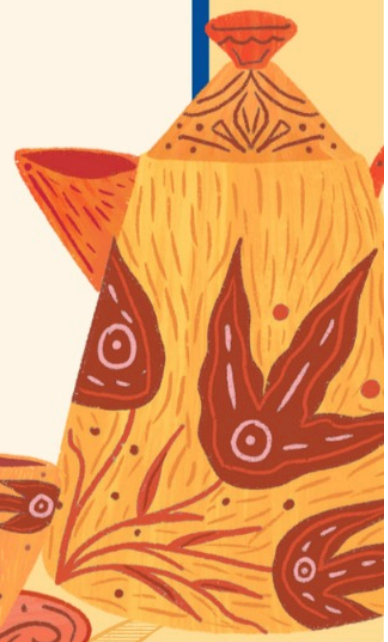

This year, more than 28,000 students from 65 schools shared their personal stories and life lessons. Their insight and reflection are a powerful reminder of the role character plays in shaping strong individuals and communities.

We extend our sincere thanks to the 136 volunteer essay judges who dedicated their time and thoughtfulness to reviewing more than 1,300 submissions. Through their efforts, 138 Grade Winners and 48 School Winners were selected and recognized for their exceptional writing and reflection. In total, \$19,250 in cash awards and honorariums was distributed to students and educators.

This program would not be possible without the commitment of our educators, volunteer judges, donors, sponsors, and 65 Rotary Club partners. Their support ensures students across Georgia have the opportunity to reflect, write, and grow.

In the coming weeks, Rotary Clubs across the state will host student recognition events, celebrating these

There are moments in life when "thank you" doesn't feel like an adequate response. Saturday night, March 14, was one of those moments. As I stood in a room filled with more than 200+ Rotarians celebrating the

75th anniversary of the **Roswell Rotary Club**, I couldn't help but feel a deep sense of appreciation. Appreciation for the people in that room, for the generations who came before us, and for the privilege of leading this club during such a meaningful year.

For 75 years, this club has lived out Rotary's motto of Service Above Self in extraordinary ways. Millions of dollars raised to support charities in our community. Lives changed through scholarships, youth programs, and Interact Clubs in our schools. Children around the world are protected through Rotary's fight to eradicate polio. We have honored veterans, helped families in need, and strengthened our community through service projects too numerous to count.

And on that particular Saturday night, all of that history was in one room.

An evening like that does not happen by accident. It happens because people step forward to serve. Bob Clarkson, Bob Hagan, Alicia Hughes and Kathy Igou worked tirelessly to make sure such a great night came together. And, as is so often the case in our club, there were so many more working quietly in the background, solving problems, filling gaps, and making sure everything ran smoothly so the rest of us could simply enjoy the celebration. Thank you to Chris Patterson (valet), the PP video team, the goodie bag and the registration teams, and so many others whose efforts made the evening truly unforgettable.

I am grateful. To that end, I think it's important to remember to be grateful for the big gestures and for the small. And if I can be honest for a moment, I lost sight of that for a period of time on Saturday night. As I got ready for the celebration, my mind wasn't on the milestone but it was on the details. The small things. The things that I didn't believe were quite right. A timing issue here, a setup detail there, the little imperfections that, in the moment, felt bigger than they really were. I carried those thoughts with me into the evening. It probably wasn't noticed by all, but it certainly was to me, and it had its effect...

But as the night unfolded, I began hearing a very different story from everyone around me. People were smiling, laughing, and celebrating. They spoke about how special the night felt, how meaningful it was, how proud they were to be part of something so much bigger than themselves. To them, it wasn't a night of small flaws, but it was a perfect celebration of 75 years of service, fellowship, and impact.

Somewhere along the way, I realized the problem wasn't about these small things of the night. The issue was my perspective. I had been staring at the small dots, missing the wide, beautiful canvas around them. I missed the forest for the trees as the saying goes....And when I finally stepped back and chose gratitude, I saw what everyone else had seen all along... It wasn't just a good night. It was a perfect one.

When I chose gratitude, when I intentionally looked for the blessings around me, it shifted my perspective and made me a better man that night! Perhaps the greatest feeling of gratitude I carried home that evening was the honor of serving as president of this remarkable club during its 75th year. Leadership in Rotary is never about one person. It is about standing on the shoulders of those who came before us and doing our best to carry the torch forward. Seventy-five years ago, a group came together with a simple idea: By serving others, they could make Roswell a better place to live.

To every member of this club, thank you for the honor of leading during this historic 75th year. Thank you for your support, your service, and your friendship. And most of all, thank you for continuing a legacy that began 75 years ago and will continue long after us.
