From Interact and Rotaract to GRSP, RYLA, Laws of Life, scholarships, and mentoring, we are not just serving youth — we are investing in the future of our communities and our world. The photos are from District Conference, where many of you saw an amazing show on Saturday morning showcasing our GRSP, RYE, Laws of Life, RYLA programs. GRSP students acted as golf cart drivers and many great interactions occurred. April was a pretty exciting month and started with some fun on April Fool's Day. Then, we got ready for several district wide events this month, including our **Club Leadership Learning Seminar** (formerly District Learning Assembly) in Columbus. About 170 club and district leaders joined together there to get ready for their upcoming roles in the next Rotary year. It was a very well received event with great presenters and overall programming to ensure networking, learning and readiness for leaders. DG Steve Ivory presented the state of the district, a vote was taken to approve RY24-25's financials and DGE Cynthia Edwards presented her vision for 26-27.

Special Events: Anna and I had the distinct honor of attending two special events in April. One was the **Rotary Club of Buckhead's Foundation Fundraiser** in which the club raised over \$200K for their future community projects. We also joined DGE Cynthia Edwards, DGN Buck Buchanan and future AG Jared Evans for the special 70th Anniversary Celebration of the **Midtown Atlanta Rotary Club (MARC)**, where the city presented a proclamation in the club's honor. The governor line participated in a service project with MARC and DG Steve presented several awards the club won at District Conference [MARC 70th Anniversary](#).

Foundation Giving: Extremely proud of our district! We lead Zone 34 in Polio Plus giving and are in second place among the Zone's 14 districts in Annual Fund giving - only about \$11,000 behind the leader. Please consider giving so we can show the zone our generosity and support of our Rotary Foundation. Total giving this year is an incredible \$1,053,991 with \$539,533 to our Annual Fund and \$258,377 to Polio Plus!"

Service Project Later This Week: Service opportunity coming up May 6-9 at Camp Tanglewood in Augusta - focus on repairs and improvements at the camp, and volunteers are encouraged to participate in what promises to be a meaningful and rewarding experience.

Membership: Our district is working on forming several new clubs including the recently chartered **Southern Crescent Rotaract Club**, the **Rotary Club of North Atlanta Professional Alliance**, which started with 16 and has 15 new members in the process of joining. There's also a new club forming that will likely meet in Buckhead at a restaurant owned by a former Rotaractor/Interactor. This emerging club has 25-30 prospective members, thanks to the outstanding efforts of Audley Knight and the District Membership Committee. And, there is a prospective companion club, another Rotaract club and potentially another new club all in the formation process. Unfortunately, we have a club that will be turning in its charter in an area of major business decline. We are working to transfer individual memberships to other clubs. Our district membership is currently 3812 and we started 2025 with 3765.

Thank You for Your Service: You'll see many stories in this newsletter about awards presented to individuals and clubs at District Conference last month. I wanted to shout out to two individuals - my wife Anna and Carol Abreu from Roswell for their support throughout my year as District Governor. And to everyone in the district, know that we're proud of all of you for the work you do to make a difference in your communities and the world, and the support you provide for Rotary.

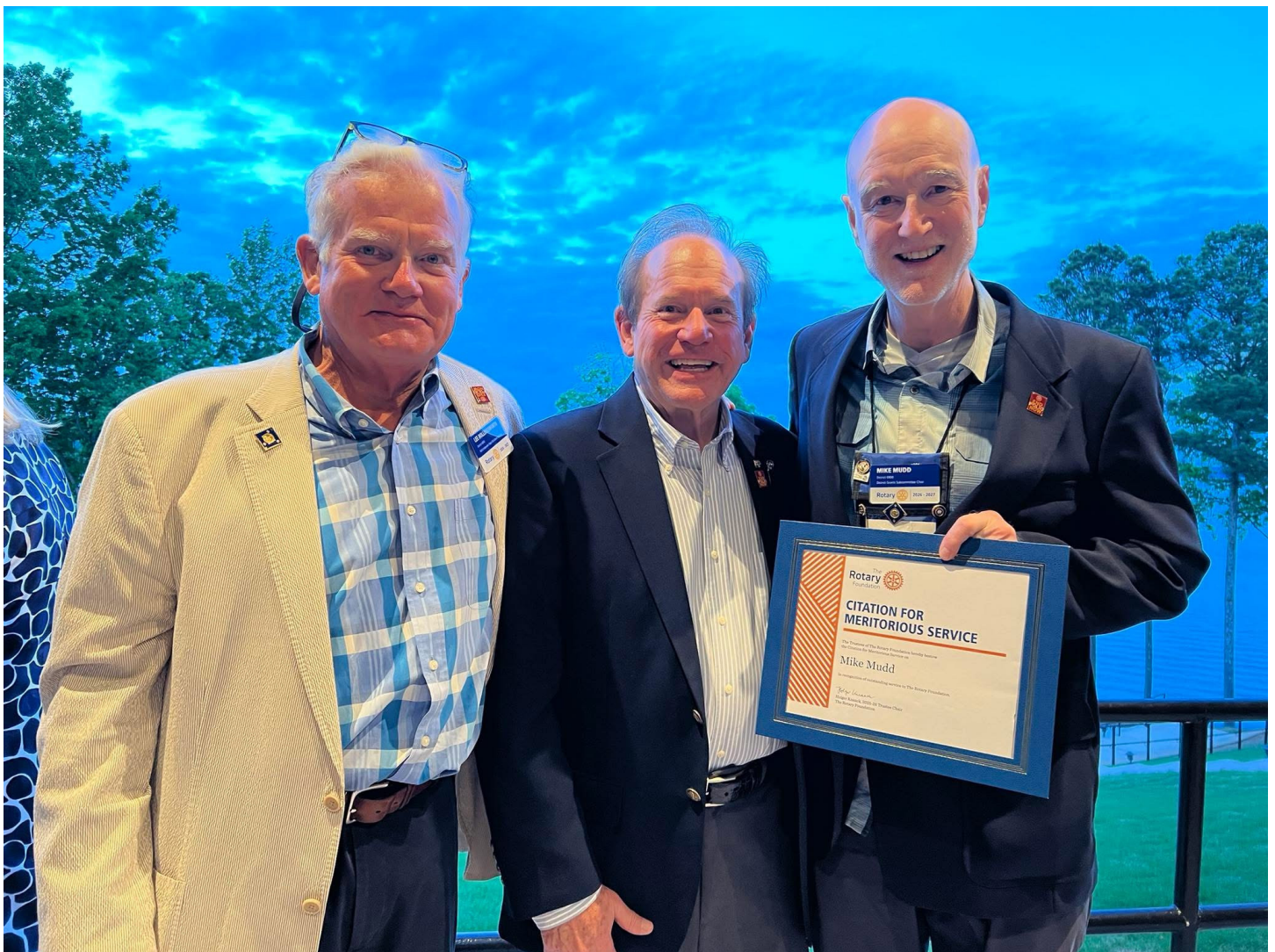

Sometimes It's Just Extra Special!

Every year at this time, Rotarians of District 6900 gather to examine and celebrate another year at what we call the District Conference. It is always a time of good fun, excitement and anticipation of which individuals and what clubs will lead the district in all the different categories of achievement. It truly is a special time of celebration and good-natured kidding among clubs about who will outdo whom.

This year's conference was no different, but it was extra special. For all who were able to attend, we were treated to some extraordinary speakers, but there was one speaker in particular that I really wasn't expecting. His topic certainly is one I personally focus on more than most and that is Polio. The presenter was Ramesh Ferris, a Polio survivor and a Past District Governor out of Canada, who treated us to a

personal inside look into Polio. He began his speech by literally crawling through the crowd to the podium and then proceeded to put on his leg braces as he spoke to the collected convention. It was truly a dramatic entrance as he drove home the point of the devastating effects of Polio on the personal life of those who contract this devastating disease. He carried us through his personal story of contracting Polio at a very young age and took us through his journey of adoption into a family far from his native home of India. His story is nothing short of remarkable and his personal crusade is far more than simply inspiring.

After hearing such a story so graphically shared by Ramesh it was extremely gratifying to review the latest numbers for Zone 34 to see where our own District 6900 fared when compared to the rest of Zone 34. We led the Zone in some very important categories such as number one in the Polio Total of Cash plus DDF at \$310,949, eclipsing the second-place district by \$65,401!! We were also number one in the Polio Per Club Average of \$3,757, just \$31 ahead of the runner up district. Our district was also number one in total giving of AF+Polio+Endowment+Other giving with a total of \$1,017,462. We took first place by just shy of \$83,000. Several other categories we came close to the top. finishing second or third in AF % Donor Participation, Total number of Paul Harris Society Members (a category we should make more of) and Polio Per Capita (Cash Only). We were edged out by District 6970, a Florida District, from finishing first in AF Total by just \$471, with totals of \$516,776 to \$516,306. All in all, District 6900 has much to be proud of and all of you played a big role in achieving our success.

Keeping with the Polio theme of dollars raised, our Zone 34 has much to be proud of as well. The Zone raised \$5,842,286 in "Total \$ Impact to Fight Polio." This number is reached by adding Cash+DDF+All Matches. Our partnership with the Gates Foundation to eradicate Polio worldwide continues to be a blessed marriage and moving forward to the realization of the fight!

In conclusion for this month's article, let me just say, if you missed this year's District 6900 Conference, you truly missed a special event of learning and comradery and if you have never attended a district conference, I can't encourage you enough to come join your fellow 6900 Rotarians next April in Asheville, NC. I guarantee it's time well spent!

The Frank E. Bentley GRSP Leadership Award is presented to a District 6900 Rotarian who has displayed outstanding Leadership in the promotion of the Georgia Rotary Student Program. Frank E. Bentley, Sr. passed away in December 2000 after a year-long battle with Leukemia. Frank selflessly served Rotary in many capacities including President of the Rotary Club of Sandy Springs, District Governor of District 6900 (1983-1984), and Georgia State Endowment Chairman for the Georgia Rotary Student Program. Sandy Springs contends many Rotarians have contributed to the tremendous success of GRSP, but few have shown more love and concern for the GRSP than Frank E. Bentley, Sr.

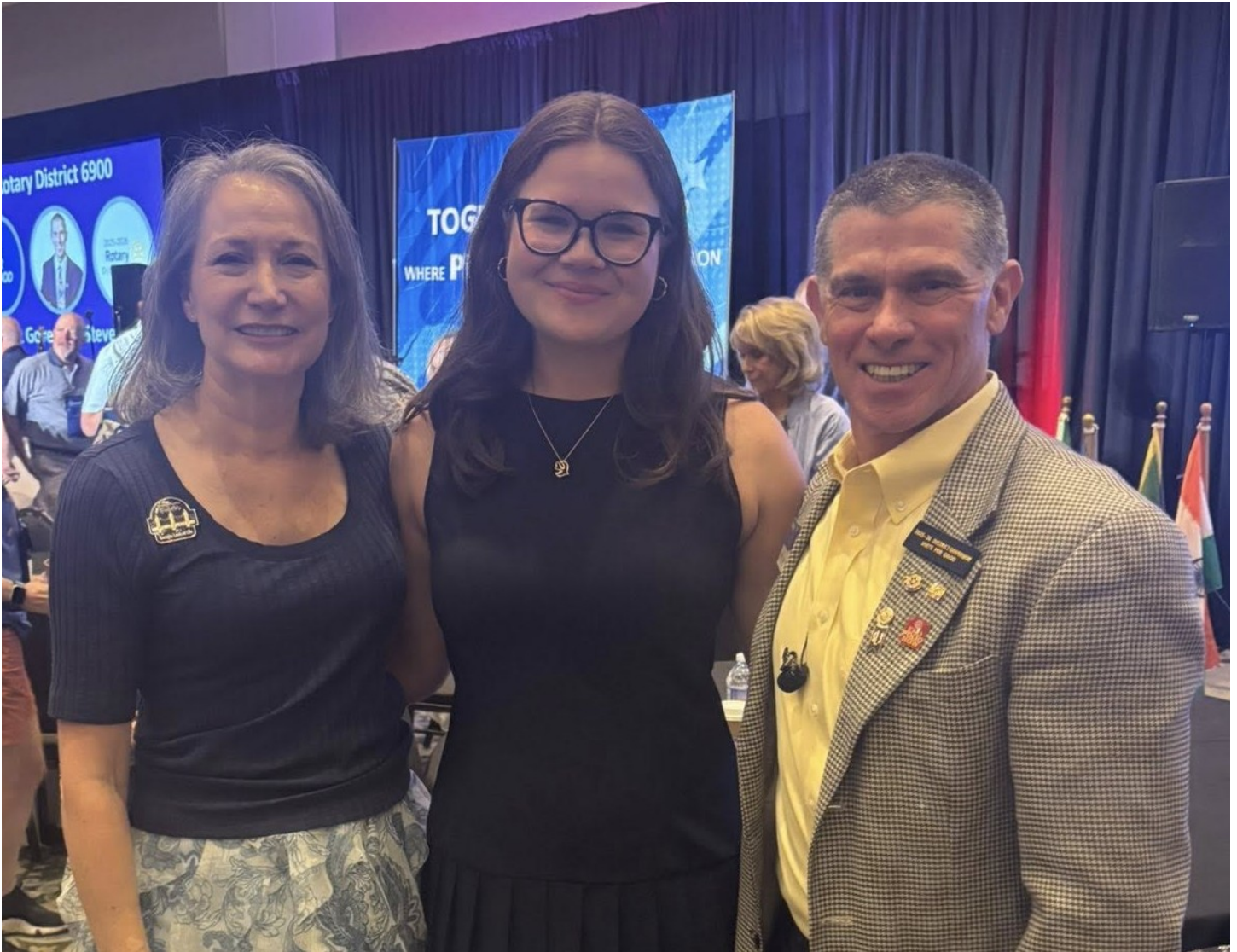

District 6900 welcomes and celebrates Serbian District 2483's delegation, Vladimir Matic and Vladimir Laloservic. The ongoing partnership has fostered multiple Global Grants that organize elementary, middle, and high school student competitions in Robotics and AI — cutting-edge knowledge and engaging educational processes that can be shared across school systems globally.

The Foundation provides only the seed funding. From there, every Global Grant:

- Requires all parties to contribute their own funds and volunteer time
- Requires a realistic, self-sustaining process that delivers continued and increasing benefits
- Lets donors see exactly where their dollars are being used
- Invites Rotarians to participate directly as volunteers are needed
- Allows us to identify needs ourselves and build our own projects

The Foundation changes the attitude of “that’s a shame” into “we can fix that.”

It changes our role in the world.
